Panayoti Kelaidis, Senior Curator and Director of Outreach, Denver Botanic Gardens, will complete a comparative study of flora in the Thessalian (Greece) and Turkish Olympus regions in July 2015. The study consists of climbing Mt. Olymbos (in Thessaly, Greece) and Ulu Dag (in Turkey) to compile a comparative list of plants of ornamental potential on the two mountains and compare their ecology and floristics. This will be the first formal exploration trip to Greece and Turkey for the staff at Denver Botanic Garden. Panayoti anticipates that this trip will better understand 1) what is currently in horticultural collections, 2) what could be targeted in the future, and 2) develop a relationship with Greek and Turkish botanists to facilitate the exchange of germplasm.

It has two core components; academic study to improve leadership skills and support of travel to meet with leaders to build on that academic experience.
